PERSONAL PROFILES. OUR SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT.

Lieutenant Colonel G.S. STAZIKER. RFD. ED.RL.
Stuart Staziker was born at Forbes N.S.W. on the 15/1/38, and educated at FORBES Intermediate High School, Newington College and Sydney Technical College.

His career has been diverse, encompassing Caltex Oil in Australia and the United Kingdom, Shell Oil Refining, Dermide Australia, Bliss Welding Products and Vane Australia, where he is currently the Office Manager. It is interesting to note that on joining Caltex Oil in 1956 he worked in the Accounting Department with 7th Fd Regt identity Maj Laurie Hindmarsh.

Stuart's military career began with the School Cadets in Forbes, progressed in the Air Training Corps at Newington and finally got serious when he was conscripted into 13th National Service Training Battalion at Ingleburn in January 1958.
He was posted to 23 Field Regiment where he quickly qualified the service of the service o

for 1st Appointment, was promoted 2nd Lieutenant and posted to GunPosition Officer in June 1959. In the years that follow ed he filled most officer postings in 23 Fd Regt, commanded all its sub-units and became the Second in Command under the late Colonel Michael Burge. He took command of 133 Locating Battery in July 1981, and C.O. 7th Fd Regtin July 1983 and was posted as the Artillery Instructor on Senior Course at the Reserve Command and Staff College in July 1986.

During 1963 and 1964 Stuart was seconded to 1st Regiment Royal Horse Artillery (Honourable Artillery Company) in London for eighteen months and then undertook a further second ment of a month with 25 Medium Regt in Germany. A course at the Royal School ofArtillery, Larkhill was a highlightof his stay in the UK. In April 1971, he undertook a CMF Observer trip to South Vietnam where he was seconded to 12 Field Regt for three weeks.

On January the 14th 1988, Lieutenant Colonel Staziker retired after thirty years in the Army Reserve. A highlight of his last days in the army was being invited by a friend of many years, Brigadier J.E. Colvin. AM. RFD. ED. to be the Review in Officer of the Lof 88 Recruit Course passing out parade

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" THE WHOLE STAFF VOLUNTEERED "

In the first week of June, 1917, the 3rd Australian Division, then part of 11 Anzac Corps, was making final preparations for the Offensive at Messines, scheduled to commence on the 7th of June. The Operation was timed to start at 3.10 a,m.on that day, with the explosion of nineteen Mines on Messines Ridge. An intense Preliminary Bombardment had commenced on the 31st of May and five Australian Field Artillery Brigades including The 7th A.F.A. were taking part.

The Messines Offensive was the first Major Operation for the 3rd Division A.I.F. and all ranks were determined to prove that, although less experienced, they were in no way inferior

to the older Australian Divisions.

26th Battery,7th Field Artillery Brigade, commanded by Capt. T.A.J.Playfair was in action in Ploegsteert Wood. Danny Herbert, The Battery Trumpeter, made the following entry in his Diary on the 2nd of June:-

"Still very heavy bombarding but mostly by us. Volunteers to go over behind the Infantry in the Push were called for from the Staff . The whole Staff volunteered, so five men were drawn for ".



NOTES FROM THE DESK OF THE COMMANDING OFFICER. 7TH.FIELD REGIMENT R.A.A., LT. COL. A.R. MAIN.

Since the 1987 edition of "Yandoo" changes have occurred in all but two of the senior appointments within the Unit. The most recent change has been that of the Commanding Officer, when on 11 May this year the writer, Lt Col Rick Main, succeeded Lt Col Bob Hill who has moved to Headquarters 2nd Division. Major Dennis Barrow, previously BC 113 Fd Bty, is also now at Hq 2 Div where he is undertaking a period of full time duty. For the time being 113 Bty is without a batery commander, a situation which is obviously undesirable but not easily rectified. Other changes have been Major Max Coaster-Garten taking over 28 Fd Bty and Major John Fairless posted to the Reserve Command and Staff College as a student on the Senior Course. BC HO Bty is now Major Peter Widelowski who, like the current CO, is a Regular Army Officer. The end of 1987 saw the posting out and promotion of the previous Adjutant and Captain Karl Delaney now fills that position.

With all these moves explained it is now time to recall the major events of the past 12 months or so. As part of the Commander Land Command Artillery (referred to phonetically as Clacka, and previously known as Commander Fd Force Arty) plan to alternate Annual Field Training (AFT) year about with a Combined Courses Camp (CCC) the Regiment concentrated its resources together with 5/11 and 23 Fd Regts to conduct individual training courses during October. Nine types of courses were scheduled ranging from Gun No to subject 4 for Warrant Officer. Concurrent with the CCC eight officers attended courses at the School of Artillery. Overall 63 students from 7 Fd Regt attended courses with a success rate of 90.5%. Instructional and support responsibilities were shared between the participating Units with some assistance from other sources. The non-Artillery course was a Fitter Armament course conducted by the Technical Support Troops.

Also in 1987 two members of the Regiment, Lt Chris Walder and Sgt Pat Sengos, joined 103 Fd Bty of 8/12 Mdm Regt, for four weeks to participate in Exercise Northern Star which was held in the UK. Promotion to the Senior NCO ranks came for Sgt Amelia Wilson in Oct 87 and for Sgt David Leek in Mar 88. Two retirements this year have seen WO2 Danny Toplis depart in January after 36 years service and WO2 Lance Gilkinson in March after service with both Regular and Reserve Forces, his last six years having been with

113 Fd Bty.

Training activities for 1988 will culminate in late October with our AFT at Singleton. The change of location from Wide Bay in Qld may be a disappointment for some however circumstances make it necessary. The build-up includes four weekend field firing exercises, each of which is preceded by observation of fire training weekends using the simulator at the School of Artillery. In addition the perhaps not so exciting but necessary Infantry minor tactics, training, CPX and Unit and CDA TEWTS have to be worked into the programme.

Notes from the CO's desk cont.

In the latter part of theyear the gun detachments will prove their skills at direct firing and quick actions as these are requirements for the unit assessment by CDA staff during the AFT. I anticipate that the HQ Bty RCP will also be ready for assessment by then. Once the gun batteries have completed their ARTEP we enter the final phase of the AFT which will include battle efficiency testing, small arms qualifications and an introduction to NBCD training — there may be a few surprises in learning what it is like being a gunner working dressed like a deep sea diver.

The final major event of the year will be our assistance again, for their 1812 Overture, to the 1st Recruit Training Battalion at Kapooka. I look forward to a happy and successful association with 7 Fd Regt. My first impressions are pleasing and I expect that with the combined dedication of those who currently serve, and withthe support of those from the past, we can together expand on the solid base which exists now to meet challenges and changes facing the 2nd Division in the future.

A SHORT HISTORY OF ARTILLERY - PERIOD THE 19th CENTURY.

"The contribution of the Artillery to final victory hs been immense - the artillery has been terrific."

Montgomery of Alemain.

The 19th century brought the most far reaching changes to the science of Gunnery. In 1803 the British Army adopted the rounded explosive case shot, which had been invented about 1784 by Lt Henry Shrapnel

and has since been called "Shrapnel".

In its original form it consisted of a round shell case with a thin compartment separating a charge of powder from a number of lead balls that filled a major part of the case, the fuse was inserted in the powder chamber and was designed to explode the shell at a predetermined range whilst in the air over the

heads of the enemy. Explosive shells of all kinds came into more extensive use as the century progressed. New explosives were discovered, rifled barrels were produced, steel was used for gun construction. Rifling was one of the major steps forward during this period, nearly doubling the accurate range of most cannons. Types and shapes of shells improved with the introduction of elongated projectiles and improved fuses. Metal cartridge cases, smokeless gun powder, recoil systems, use of breech blocks, improved sighting equipment and better organisation.

blocks, improved sighting equipment and better organisation all developed during this century.

Then in 1897 the French introduced a 75mm gun which made all other guns obselete. It fired a 161b shell at a rate of 30 rds a minute. It had a recoil system and a telescopic sight for an indirect firing technique. The armies of the world quickly adopted similar field guns but the French 75mm gun remained the formost field artillery weapon throughout World War 1. *********
