# FROM THE DESK OF LIEUTENANT COLONEL A.R. MAIN COMMANDING OFFICER 7TH FIELD REGIMENT RAA

Exercise Northern Drive was the Regimental Annual Field Training Exercise for 1988. It was conducted at Singleton during the period 15-19 October. The exercise was an ambitious attempt to combine the necessary 'normal' training with activities that provided added interest, variety, and a challenge.

Northern Drive commenced with a short period of infantry minor tactics designed to allow everyone to 'switch on' their basic soldier skills - getting familiar with carrying rifle and webbing everywhere, living in the bush and eating ration packs. Captain John Wilson was responsible for this first phase which was most successful and set the standard for the following phases.

Following this, the regiment turned to an intensive period of gunnery training in preparation for the Commander 2nd Divisional Artillery's (CDA) Assessment. This phase of the exercise included periods of fire and movement designed to exercise the gun line and technical shooting to finely tune the skills of the forward observers and their parties. The gunnery phase of AFT culminated in the CDA's Assessment. The regiment fired a total of 1356 rounds of various types during the exercise.

With the gunnery phase complete, the regiment turned to other soldier skills. A small arms practice was conducted with everyone firing the SLR, M16, pistol, and SMG. Grenades were also thrown and a large number of personnel were fortunate to fire the M60 machine gun and the soon to be introduced into service STEYR assault rifle. 26,000 rounds of small arms ammunition were fired to good effect by the regiment. By his planning and organisation of the range practices, Major Max Coaster-Garton ensured that the last phase of AFT 88 ended as the first had done - on a high note!

Annual physical training tests were conducted as was a 15km route march. As well, chemical defence instruction was undertaken with the highlight (?) being a gas chamber exercise. Not a pleasant experience but necessary in our training for war.

Amidst the training, the regiment did, however, find time to pursue some of the more social aspects of service. The old adage "work hard - play hard" was certainly adhered to. All in all the exercise was highly successful, especially given the hottest October weather for many years, demonstrating our ability as that elite group of soldiers known as Gunners.

Since last writing, there have been few changes in our Manning. Two changes which should be mentioned are the arrival of Major John Fairless as Regimental Second-in-Command and the departure, after 10 years, of Bombardier 'Kimbo' Kimberley. Kimbo has transferred to RAEME and is now posted to Adelaide.

## OUR OTHER VICE PRESIDENT.

#### Lieutenant Owen SAVILLE. (R).

Owen Saville was born at North Sydney on the 8th of February 1916. He lived at The Spit, Mosman, until he joined the Regular Army in 1938. Owen's father had a boat shed at Pearl Bay near The Spit and then moved to The Spit about 1928, where he ran a fishing business.

Owen was educated at Hosman Public School, North Sydney Tech and Mosman and Manly Evening Continuation Schools. He left school in the Second year, as an economic necessity (The Depression) and then he fished, prawned, caught lobsters, worked in boat sheds and in fact did anything in that line that paid money and often as not paid nothing. During this period he continued his education and he remembers obtaining his Evening Continuation School Certificate.

His first job away from The Spit was with the Maritime Services Board, still on the water, which he commenced in 1935. In 1937 he left the M.S.B. and went to work for The Colonial Sugar Refining Company.

In 1938 he joined The Regular Army in 1st Field Cadre R.A.A.

He had been a volunteer in the A.M.F. prior to this as a part time soldier, and his Army service is recorded as follows:-

1932 Joined 7th Field Brigade R.A.A. as a Cadet.

Promoted to Bombardier. . 1934

1935 Promoted to Sergeant.

1938 Enlisted in the Regular Army posted to 1st Field Cadre R.A.A.

Promoted to L/Bdr when let Fd Cadre was upgraded to "A" Fd Bty.R.A.A. 1939

4th September volunteered for overseas service in the A.I.F. 1939

1939 17th November posted to 2/1 Fd Regt R.A.A. A.I.F. and promoted Sgt. 1940 10th January sailed in Troop Ship "Orford" destination unknown. Owen served with 2/1 Fd Regt RAA. 6 Aust Div A.I.F. during the whole of its existence, rising from Sgt to W.O.1 R.S.M., in the WW2 theatres of Palestine (Israel), Egypt, Western Desert, Greece, Ceylon, Papua-New Guines in the Wau-Salamus and Aitape-Wewak campaigns.

1946 6th February, Owen returned to Sydney from the war in a poor state of health and was admitted to Concord R.G.H. in April where he remained

until November of that year.

1947 Appointed B.S.M.of 53 Battery R.A.A.

Qualified at the No 1 Artillery Course and was posted to 5 Fd Regt R.A.A. as an A.I.G. when that unit was raised at Marrickville as a unit of 2 Div R.A.A. (C.M.F.)

1949. Posted to National Service as a Platoon Cdr in 12 N.S. Battallion. Here persons called up for National Service received their initial full time training before being posted to C.M.F. units.

Posted to R.H.C. Duntroon as an A.I.G.

Posted to 7 Fd Regt R.A.A. as R.S.H. with odd periods as Adjutant.

Posted to the School of Artillery at North Head. 1960

Was discharged and appointed Lieutenant (R). 1961 Owen then joined the staff of T.C. Whittle P/L, Multi Storey Builders, and remained there untill he retired from the work force in 1979.

Retired and has been enjoying life since then, 1979

Owen says was the greatest of all his years when , on the 17th of may he and Nell were married and their union was blessed with one son, Bill.

Nell, a very courageous Lady, passed away after a long illness and 1988 Owen has had to rearrange his life accordingly. He says he has begun to feel a little aged. (Owen hasn't said much about his war service which was very meretorious as there would be few who could say they started as a Sgt and ended as W.O.1 R.S.M.of their unit, nor that his appointment as an A.I.G. at various times made him a member of that elite corps once known as The Australian Instructional Corps before W.W.2.

#### A SHORT HISTORY OF ARTILLERY - PERIOD 20TH CENTURY.

The 20th century again produced rapid changes , making possible the modern guns that are now available.

Such things as;-

Motor transport Signal communications Mass production New Tactics

improved artillery.

The guns used in both world wars were similar, but improved carriages, sights , operating equipment and target locating devices increased their efficiency.

For example the French "75" in World War 1, had a range of about 7,500 yards and its mount was designed for very little elevation and for towing by horses at about 6 mph. The same basic gun in World War 2 had a range of over 13,000 yards and a split-trail mount capable of 40 degrees of elevation; with its rubber tyred wheels , it could be towed by motor truck at speeds up to 50 miles per hour.

In 1914 the Germans used heavy Howitzers to advantage especially "Big Berthas" that could fire a 1,570 lb shell six miles from a 16.5 inch barrel, The record for long range artillery was established in 1918 by the "Big Bertha" guns that bombarded Paris with 265 lb shells at a range of 76 miles.

Light aircraft were adopted in 1942 by the United States as aerial

observation posts and to direct artillery fire.

Enemy aircraft were responsible for the extensive employment of antiaircraft artillery and dramatic results were achieved during the air defence of the British Isles.

During World War 2 improved anti-tank weapons were introduced with

velocities up to 5,000 ft/sec , in some specially built small bore guns.

In mounting guns up to 90 mm on tanks, the muzzle brake, a new recoil feature, was added, principally in German and Russian weapons. The muzzle brake was made in several shapes and sizes and it was basically an attachment to the muzzle of a gun barrel that pocketed some of the gas from the discharge so that its forward thrust on the brake would reduce the recoil of the gun.

In October 1948 I decided to join 7 Field Regiment R.A.A. thereby reversing a previous irrevocable decision never to have anything to do with the Australian Army again: I went up to Willoughby by tram on the traditional Tuesday night and after walking all over the Municipality, I eventually located the drill hall in Warrane Road.

As I walked up the ramp into the drill hall I met Lou Muxtable, immaculate in the dress of a Warrant Officer II. Recognition was mutual as I had been meeting Lou in the commercial world throughout the preceeding year. The initial greeting was mutual too; "What the.....are you doing here?" It was obvious what Lou was doing but not quite so obvious what I was doing. Lou directed me to the orderly room (still the orderly room), where Staff Sergeant Norm King quickly produced the familiar forms and arranged for jeep transport to the local medical officer for my medical examination.

Who remembers Norm King and is he still with us?

Having sailed through the most elementary of medical examinations with flying colours, Staff Sergeant King introduced me to the Adjutant, Captain J.W.Turpie, in his office. I had previously held the substantive rank of Sergeant in another corps and therefore Captain Turpie offered me immediate advancement to Bombardier on enlistment. I pointed out that my knowledge of artillery was confined to a six weeks' course on the 2 pounder Q.F. anti-tank gun in 1944 which was then an infantry weapon and that I felt that the best thing to do would be to start as a gunner. Captain Turpie put forward many reasons why I should start as a Bombardier and only those who knew Jim Turpie would know how pursuasive that silver tongue could be. I continued to hold out and finally Jim said; "You are doing the right thing Mr Hindmarsh". It was the last time that I was adressed as "Mr Hindmarsh" in that environment for two and a half years. Captain Turpie then administered the oath of allegiance and I was in again! I must say in passing that it was the third time within six years that I had taken the oath so surely there can be no doubt as to my loyalty.

All that remained then was to be issued with a parade card and to be kitted out. The regimental quartermaster, Captain Clarrie Richards (a former R.S.M.) and the R.Q.M.S., Warrant Officer 1, Bert Stevens, kitted me out. Kit consisted of:-

Kit Bag.
Hat, puggaree and chin strap.
Service dress, later pattern (a good fit).
Khaki drill trousers, two pairs (one not a good fit).
Khaki drill shirts, two.
Brown boots, two pairs.
Socks, three pairs.
Tie.
Webbing belt and anklets.

Hat badge and "collar dogs" (I continued to wear the badges from my previous service for old time's sake).

So began a relationship with 7 Field Regiment that has endured, off and on, for more than forty years and as I write I am proud to recollect that my family has now been associated with the Australian Volunteer Forces for over one hundred years.

My overwhelming impression of that first night at Willoughby was that there were so few people about. I was the only enlistment that night. Coming from a previous military environment where no movement seemed to take place unless there were about five hundred bodies involved, this was rather a shock to the system. Lack of numbers was a problem that continued to bedevil 7 Field Regiment for the remainder of my service with it and I suspect continues to this day. Is there anything that the members of this Association can do to help recruiting???
