FROM THE DESK OF LTCOL J.A.L. FAIRLESS, RFD COMMANDING OFFICER 7 FIELD REGIMENT

As I collect my thoughts to write this article, I reviewed the article I wrote for last years column. In it I mentioned the year started with a rush and it was already August with less than two months to AFX. I obviously don't need to repeat myself but 1993 has mirror imaged 1992.

The Regiment successfully completed AFX 92 at Puckapunyal. Prior to departing for AFX we were issued six Light Gun's in late September. These were in turn issued to 113 Fd Bty in Newcastle because they were the most isolated. The remaining six guns were expected to arrive early October. Unfortunately the Q-system at MLG was in full working order, and nothing was issued.

To ensure 28 Fd Bty would go to AFX with the Light Gun, six guns were drawn from 23 Field Regiment. After signing for these guns my negotiations with the Commanding Officer MLG proved successful. We then had to return the 23 Field Regiment guns and take delivery of the MLG guns. This occurred in the last three days prior to departure. To say it was a hectic period is a definite understatement.

The first week of the exercise was spent on conversion training. The exercise then moved into the Battery training phase for a short period. The exercise was completed with a four day Regimental phase. Prior to departing a Regimental parade was conducted to farewell the M2A2 Howitzer. The 12 Light Guns were deployed in a straight line and a 'Regimental Right' was fired using blank charges. During which a M2A2 was driven through the parade.

The Regiment has been active in many areas. The emphasis has been on individual IET training to ensure that as many personnel especially Gun, Signaller, OPCP and driver trades are trained. This has seen February and March weekends effectively becoming courses camp. These weekends proved very worthwhile not only for students but also for instructors who had not given formal lessons for some time.

We are well advanced in the preparations for AFX-93. This year it will be held at Singleton. We had hoped to be able to use Puckapunyal range again but due to financial constraints no exercises are to occur outside the state.

Finally, I would like to thank the Association for their continuing support. Unfortunately I will be moving on in December but be assured I will actively continue my ties with the Regiment.

STORAGE OF MEDALS

Storing your medals correctly is the most effective and easiest way of preserving them.

Museums keep their artifacts in stable, carefully regulated conditions all year round. The temperature is kept at 20 - 22 degrees and the humidity at 55%. Light levels are kept low to prevent overheating and fading.

At home, the best we can do is to keep medals clean and dry, away from extremes of temperature, humidity and light. The metal of medals can corrode from damp, and the fabric can rot. High temperature and a very dry environment make them brittle and weak.

Medals are best stored in boxes made of wood or acid-free cardboard (ordinary cardboard is acidic and can harm metals and fabrics). Before use, wooden boxes must be completely coated with three coats of polyurethane resin, then left to dry thoroughly so that no odour remains.

Wrap the medals in acid-free tissue paper or wellwashed fabric, preferably undyed. Soft cotton and linen fabrics such as sheeting, handkerchiefs or teatowels are suitable, but other fabrics such as velvet should not be used because some contain acidic dyes.

Acid-free tissue paper as well as boxes made of acid-free cardboard are available from specialist suppliers of library or conservation materials.

Handle the medals as little as possible, as acid from your fingers can harm them. We recommend wearing soft cotton gloves (readily available and inexpensive) when handling medals or any precious article.

REGIMENTAL HISTORY/COLLECTION

Once again I report that no progress has been made with the History. This situation is of course due to my heavy involvement with the RAA Association (NSW) Inc. and to the various stresses and strains in the work place over the last year.

The status of the Project is that I have completed a fair draft of about 8500 words which takes the story of the 7th to the return to Australia in 1919. Since commencing the Project six years ago considerable additional data has come to hand and as a consequence much of the draft will require rewriting. Nevertheless the draft in its present form is a formidable reference document and is serving me well in that regard.

For the future I would think that it will take me at least three to four years to complete the project. The property in the manuscript will remain with me and my family. On current prices, private publication of 500 copies would cost something in the vicinity of \$15,000.00.

Referring now to the valuable collection of Memorabilia collected on the initiative of myself. This was offerred to the National Artillery Museum last year, accepted in principle and publicly acknowledged by the Past President of the RAAHS, Col.R.V.McEvoy, in his annual report.

The physical transfer will take place progressively, item by item. The process has been delayed for the reasons stated in the opening paragraph plus reorganisation at the Museum. I am in close communication with the Museum Management.

Naturally, further data is being sought for the History together with items for the collection and I am glad to say that I have not been disappointed. I gratefully acknowledge contributions received from the following;



DECEASED MEMBERS - 1992/93

HENRY FRANCIS FISCHER - 4 August 1992 - aged 76 Henry enlisted in the AIF on 21 December 1939, joining 2/1st AGH transferring to 2/1st Field Regiment in the Middle East and was discharged on 11 December 1945 as a Gunner.

IAN HYLTON HICKS - 25 November 1992 - aged 48 Ian enlisted in 9 LAA Regiment RAA in 1964, transferring to 7 Field Regiment when 9 LAA was disbanded on 1 November 1973. Ian was placed on the reserve of Senior NCO's in 1974 with the rank of WO2.

FRED BRIDGES(RED FRED) MCALISTER, CBE, ED, PSC 23 December 1992 - aged 86

Fred joined the Sydney University Scouts in 1924, transferring to Australian Garrison Artillery (Survey Company) where he was commissioned as a Lieutenant on 12 September 1927. He was promoted to Captain on 31 August 1931 and on promotion to Major on 15 October 1935 commanded the Company.

On 13 May 1937 Fred transferred to 7 Field Brigade as Battery Commander of 107(Howitzer) Battery and in May 1939 raised 26 Field Battery.

On 1 May 1940 with the Commanding Officer of 7 Field Brigade, Lt Colonel Ralph Daly and fourteen other Officers of the Brigade, Fred transferred as Second in Command to form 2/6th Field Regiment AIF.

Promoted to temporary Lt Colonel on 9 September 1941, he commanded RAA Training Regiment (Middle East) and on 1 September 1942, having his rank of Lt Colonel substantive had the following postings; Commanded 18 Australian Field Regiment, GSO 2 Arty 2 Aust Corps, SO 1 Arty HQ RAA 3 Aust Corps, Commanded 2/1st Aust Tank/Attack Regiment, Instructor"B" Wing LHQ Tactical School. He was discharged from the AIF on 8 October 1945.

On the reforming of the CMF Fred was promoted temporary Brigadier on 2 February 1948, becoming substantive on 8 September 1949 and holding posting of CRA 2 Division until 1952. He Commanded RAA 1 Corps 1953 to 1957 and was Colonel Commandant RAA 2 Military District 1962 to 1967. He passed Senior Staff College and was awarded the CBE for his military services in 1952.

Not only did Fred have a distinguished military and civil career at CSR, his many contributions included President of Legacy Club, Sydney, Life Governor, Sydney Hospital and he was also the first Patron of the Association from 1986 to 1989.

DECEASED MEMBERS (Continued)

PHILIP DIXON NICHOLAS - 18 January 1993 - aged 72 Philip enlisted in the AIF on 21 November 1942, being commissioned as a Lieutenant in RAA reiforcements on 27 October 1942 and joining 13th Australian Field Regiment (Jungle Division) AIF on 26 April 1943. He also served in various Artillery training units before his discharge from the AIF on 13 December 1945. On 1 May 1948 Philip joined 7 Field Regiment, transferring to the Reserve of Officers on 11 May 1950.

ALAN EDWARD NORTON PRYOR - 1 June 1993 - aged 57 Alan came to the Regiment in the mid 1950's following National Service from the Royal Australian Signals. He was commissioned on 7 June 1957 and was promoted to Captain on 7 March 1962, transferring to the Reserve of Officers in the early 1960's. Alan's elder brother Ian, also obtained his commission in the Regiment. Alan in his occupation as a Sign Craftsman built the Honour Board of Commanding Officers on display in the Willoughby Depot.

REGINALD MARTIN THOMPSON ED - 26 July 1993 - aged 58 Reg was called up in May 1954 serving in 12 National Service Battalion then being transferred to 21 Field Regiment RAA.

On 7 June 1957 he was commissioned and on disbandment of 21 Field Regiment on 7 August 1957, transferred to 7 Field Regiment and later allocated to HQ RAA 1 Division from 12 July 1960 until 10 July 1961, after which he transferred back to 7 Field and was promoted to Captain on 6 March 1962. Reg went on the Reserve of Officers in the late 1960's and was placed on the Retired list on 10 July 1982.

The President and members extend sincere condolences to their families, relatives and friends.
