THOUGHTS FOR ANZAC

We pause to salute and remember our (approx 100,000*) Fallen Comrades, who are "with us" this day. (*Boer War to Vietnam).

GARDEN OF REMEMBRANCE: With gratitude we, the ex-service organisations, are greatly indebted to Willoughby City Council and their Staff, for the preservation, sanctification and message of the Garden, and other help. We acknowledge the developers of the Bus Rail Interchange at Chatswood Railway Station in their concern for the preservation of the Garden of Remembrance.

THOUGHT: "They were Saviours, all — For this better day, they died For you and I — remember?"

In this year of "AUSTRALIA REMEMBERS 1945-1995" we are commemorating the 50th Anniversary of the end of World War II. Our thoughts turn with inspiration to all those who paid the supreme sacrifice. They fought a war in defence of their country they loved, and they bequeathed to their children the opportunity they had been denied. The freedoms and democracy we enjoy, was their legacy.

We remember the First World War and the battles fought at Gallipoli and France, and on the sea and in the air. In World War II, the Australian Army was engaged in battle campaigns at Bardia, Tobruk, Greece and Crete, Syria, El Alamein. In Europe and the Middle East some 6,532 Australian Airmen lost their lives. The RAAF Squadrons arrived in Malaya in 1941. In the defence of that country, 1,789 Australians were killed and 15,384 becoming Prisoners-of-War to the Japanese and they suffered unspeakable atrocities.

The Naval Forces were involved in many campaigns such as the Aegean Sea Battle, Coral Sea Battle, Midway Island Battle, Savo Island and Leyte Gulf Battles whilst suffering the loss of many ships, such as HMAS Sydney, HMAS Perth and HMAS Canberra.

We remember the Army engagements at Milne Bay, Kokoda Track, Gona, Buna, Sanananda, Salamanua, Huon Peninsular, Shaggy Ridge, Bougainville, New Britain, Aitape, Wewak and Borneo. There were 66,568 women enlisted in the Royal Australian Navy, Australian Army and the Royal Australian Air Force.

Australia came directly under attack. Darwin was bombed in 1942 and 1943. Broome was bombed with 70 persons being killed and Townsville had air raids. There were submarine attacks on Sydney and Newcastle in 1942. In 1944 Japanese Breakout in Cowra occurred.

V.E. Day on May 8, 1945 brought the end of the war in Europe, whilst V.J. day on 15 August, 1945 brought victory in the Pacific. Australia lost 27,073 killed in action or died as Prisoners of War, 23,477 were wounded and 22,264 became Prisoners of War. YES - AUSTRALIA REMEMBERS.
