THE VICTORIA CROSS

The Victoria Cross (VC) was instituted by Queen Victoria in 1856. The first issue being made to 61 recipients on June 26 1856 (47 Army &14 Navy).

Original ribbon colours were crimson Army and blue Navy. During WW I crimson was adopted for all 3 services.

The Cross has always been made from bronze of Russian guns captured in the Crimean war, however during WW I metal from captured Chinese guns was used. Ample stock of Russian metal, melted into ingots, is held by the Royal Ordnance Corps.

Unlike most medals, the VC is not stamped out from a die, each one is separately made from skilled craftsmen using the same process as those of 100 years ago. It also has the manufacturing firms secret mark on the medal to enable detection of forgeries.

The award is open to both service and civilian personnel. Three cases of both father and son receiving the award are recorded and four known cases of brothers. Perhaps the most outstanding are the three recipients who were awarded the V.C. with bar.

To date 1,349 Crosses and three with bars have been awarded (this does not include UK v's Argentine played at the Falkland Islands). How many rounds are fired for the following Gun Salutes.

Reasons for Doing Something about the Imbalance

Sometimes when I have outlined the arguments above, officers have responded with. "So what?"

The short answer is that the GRes is denying itself a group of people who are likely to be better soldiers on average than the ones they have now. Here are the reasons:

Higher intelligence and capacity to learn.

It is clear that generally each part of the Army takes GE entrants who are below educational standards for the general community. Table 3 compares educational levels for the 20 to 24 year old population generally in 1992 with those of satisfactory GE applicants for the ARA, RRes and GRes in 1993.

Fighting wars is generally considered to be a business for young soldiers. The ARA and RRes personnel policies certainly reflect this. If you accept this idea, the GRes figures are disturbing. GRes soldiers on average start late and the gap between ARA and GRes generally gets larger up to MAJ. It is easy to explain the slower progress in terms of less training time, but if age is important, then we need to do something about it. This indicates the GRes needs to recruit more younger soldiers, and soldiers who are more likely to progress quickly. Tertiary students are an obvious answer on both counts. Also, the Wrigley Report² quotes US National Guard evidence that high school graduates have a significantly higher retention rate than non-graduates.

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Exercise Spiderman '95 by L bdr Purtell

Background:

13 Bde, of which 7Fd Bty is a part, is the WA based ARES brigade. This brigade has a well-defined area of responsibility, that being the iron-ore loading facilities in the Pilbara region of WA. There are two loading areas, Port Headland and Dampier. The object of this exercise was to protect the facility at Dampier with a brigade (minus). The port facilities at Dampier move over 20% of Australia's export dollars. Not something you want a potential enemy to disrupt or destroy.

The enemy in this occasion consisted of Kamarian raider battalions played well by elements of SAS, 6RAR and a WA based battalion. Unlike many exercises where the enemy has a script to play to, the enemy in this exercise was free-reign, ie. no constraints on their actions. This gave them the ability to exploit weaknesses that they found in the brigade plan, or actions of individual units.

Terrain:

Ask anyone who has ever been there, whether they have any rocks in Dampier. Then duck!! Large rock outcroppings made from iron-ore rocks ranging in size from golf balls to Unimog size. These rocks are everywhere. Where there are no rocks there is this stuff called spinifex. Spinifex is a tussock type plant with sharp spikes on the end of each blade. I'm still patching holes in my Therma-Restf

Dampier township is actually located on the Burrup peninsula, connected to the mainland by one major causeway which crosses massive salt flats. Turns out it is a salt mine where a large amount of Australia's salt comes from! The Burrup peninsula is pretty much the same geology as the remainder of the Pilbara region, rock outcrops separated by rocky gullies covered with sparse plants.

Off the Burrup peninsula is a collection of about 10 islands, the close-in ones called East, West, North and South Intercourse Islands. Apparently in the olden days the Whalers would land on the mainland near an Aboriginal camp and 'invite' some Gins(Women) into one of their longboats with a musket and a few clubs. The Gins would then be left on the islands for crew R & R. Nice bunch of people, some of our forefathers.

Equipment:

Pick up your Steyr on the way out. Next find your truck to put all this stuff into. I couldn't find my truck. It didn't exist. I was issued a substitute truck (LR110 GS). Too bad about the FO stores in the back of the vehicle, Laser Rangefinder, Radio, etc.

Recreation:

The theme at the end-of-camp piss-up seemed to be "well I've got all day tomorrow to sleep it off". Apparently a few folks from 113Bty went down to the grunt unit and removed the chromed 81mm mortar (including baseplate!) from outside the office of the grunt CO. Thinking that they had probably bitten off a bit too much, they return it, only to be caught by the grunt RSM. He tells them to leave it in the hallway and disappears off towards the offices muttering something about finding the Duty Officer and having a word with him.

Comms:

You remember that iron-ore rock? Well, it absorbs radio waves really well. 77 sets were next to useless (Aren't they always?).

Having planned for this, the brigade has made sure that all it's units have been issued with Raven sets. I am told the Bty has 2.

The remainder of the Bty (all the FO parties like mine) end up carrying 13kg F1 sets, while the pretty, 6kg (@ \$17,000!! each) Raven sets sat back at Bty CP, on desks, in an air-conditioned room. When they said F1, I thought that they were talking about a truck (hey, I am TPT).

Award for most reliable comms goes to

Telecom Mobilenet Analogue.

F1 set with original batteries.

Turns out the batteries are rechargeable NiCads. No-one knows how to use the charger, until we find someone in another unit.

We end up using 2 x 77 batteries daisy chained together (to make 24V). This makes for a really smashing manpack radio. (The only reason I didn't smash mine was that my FO officer felt that they wouldn't believe an L&D that said the F1 jumped off the mountain by itself!)

Lurch (GNR Dochary from 28Bty), solves the problem of the recharging of the batteries when he initiates a section attack on the generator. He believed it to be a Kamarian sniper.(That genny won't dare backfire ever again!!)

He is subsquently charged with and found guilty of predudicial conduct (a UD).

Food:

Not as good as Leonie's. Nuff said.

The Ex:

It took me 10 days of sitting on; hilltops, rocks, spinifex, mangroves, figtrees, mud, sand being eaten alive by mosquitoes, flies, sandflies, midges, flies, mosquitoes, flies to see a really impressive number of Kamarian raider soldiers: NIL.

I did see; flies, mosquitoes, sandflies, midges, spinifex, rocks, rocks, Indian ocean water, rocks, etc.

Transport:

At 2230hrs board C130 at Richmond and fly to Albany(5 Hours), leave Albany and fly to Pearce to land at 0530hrs local time (0730 EST). I don't think any one of us slept for much more than 1.5hrs all night. Bus to the barracks at some place called Karracutta(?)(turns out to be about 4km from Perth CBD). At the barracks we have some really good bacon and eggs for breakfast. At this point it is 0830hrs and we are all dead on our feet.

Not so dead that we don't notice BLUEY O'NEILL (ex TST) wandering around looking like he belongs there. Turns out he does. He joined up when he and Jude moved to WA.

So, we ask him where this exercise is at and what time tomorrow are we leaving? The exercise is at some place called Karratha(where the hell is that?) and we are leaving at 1030 today!

BSM 7Fd Bty calls all 7Fd Regt (just say 7Fd) people together and briefs us. Some of us are stunned to learn that the exercise is 1600km North of Perth and that WE are expected to drive there, over the next three days.(So much for a certain WO at 28Bty saying that the exercise is just outside Perth, bit like saying that Brisbane is just outside Melbourne!) Apparently we are going to be teamed with a WA person for the drive so that our fatigue will not be a problem. I am stunned to find that they have a BDR Hogan in WA. I expect that Hogues was stunned to find that they have a LBDR Purtell in WA too! So much for that idea.

Coming back is much the same story MAMBA (Miles And Miles of Bloody Australia) followed by a RAAF flight back to the East coast. This time the plane is a 707 and we return via Brisbane, not that some of us noticed.

Things Learnt from Ex:

- 7Fd Bty is a damn good unit with a Q system that defies description.
- Lots of fun to be had by all.
- Bloody long way from home.
- I'm told WA has real hills in it, didn't see any myself.
- Bored Grunts are trigger happy. We lost an entire section to 16 Battalion Ready Reaction Force when they came bursting into our AO, without clearance, without telling anybody, and engaged one of our patrols at night and wiped it out to a man without issuing so much as one challenge. Platoon commander subsequently charged with murder.
- Bucket drivers cannot navigate. LBDR Fairfield reports feeling like a policeman at an intersection when he was on covert OP duty near Karratha Station. He reckons that he redirected at least a dozen lost buckets when they cruised up to his OP and asked for directions.
